SPREADING AWARENESS

Imagine walking into school on your first day, not knowing anybody. That should not last very long. From the very start of the school year, clubs at North have been striving to be as inclusive as possible.

For example, at Bloomington's Pridefest this year, the United Students Gender and Sexuality Alliance (GSA), one of many clubs at North, held a booth to inform the community about themselves, their goals, and their accomplishments. One instance of this is the annual Day of Silence, a nationwide, student-led demonstration to spread the word about bullying of LGBTQ+ youth.

Arthur Hahn (12), the president of GSA, said, "We're a safe and inclusive space, and we provide an opportunity for students to learn and talk about things that they don't get to talk about in their usual classes." Hahn joined GSA as a freshman to see what it was about and became a leader after having a good experience.

Another club, Bring Change 2 Mind

(BC2M) has been doing their best to be accessible and raise awareness about significant issues. They meet twice a month and promote mental health awareness and self-care, and members participate in community-building activities. Normally each meeting starts with a presentation about the topic of the month and a discussion before getting into an activity.

BC2M has hosted events in previous years like a Halloween party or karaoke party for the school to serve as fun and stress relief. This year, they have been planning more events and have worked to spread awareness to Tri-North Middle School by speaking to students about suicide prevention and mental health in their health classes.

"In the club a lot of people are pretty close, and we are open to anybody," said Lainey Wagner (12), a leader in the club. "We get a lot of different opinions, which is really great." She encourages anybody to join at any time to help make a positive difference at BHSN.


