## BEST IN SHOW





## *Taste of Bloomington returns after five-year COVID hiatus*

After it was canceled in 2020 due to the COVID pandemic, the annual Taste of Bloomington food festival returned to Kirkwood Ave. in downtown Bloomington on August 2.
